Period	• a declarative sentence	The key to good driving is concentration.
	an imperative sentence	Follow that car.
	an indirect question	He asked if I was too tired to drive.
Exclamation point	• an exclamatory sentence	What phenomenal skill she has <mark>!</mark>
	 a strong interjection 	Oh, no!
	 words that express a sound 	Crash!
Question	• an interrogative sentence	Did you check the oil?
mark	• a declarative sentence that asks a question	You ran out of gas?

Other Uses of Periods

Periods are also used with abbreviations and in outlines.

Putting Periods in the Proper Places		
Usage	Rule	Example
Abbreviations	Use a period with abbreviations or initials.	Mr. Emil T. Schmidt, Sr., Sat., 2 A.M., A.D., 1 hr., 32 ft., Main St., Ala., Speedy Tires Ltd.
Outlines	Use a period after each number or letter in an outline or list.	A. Longest traffic jam B. Oldest driver C. Biggest car

Do not include periods with these abbreviations: metric measurements (cm ml kg g l), acronyms (NATO UNICEF NASA NASCAR), abbreviations that are pronounced letter by letter (CIA NBA IRS), state names in postal addresses (TX CA FL), points on a compass (N E S W).
